1.Introduction

In December 2021, *People at the Heart of Care* was published, setting out a 10-year vision for reforming adult social care, which put people and families at the heart, with three key objectives:

- People have **choice, control, and support** to live independent lives
- People can access outstanding **quality and tailored** care and support
- People find adult social care **fair and accessible**.

The paper recognised the transformative potential of technology for achieving the wider ambitions for reform and dramatically improving the quality and safety of care and committed to:

1. Ensure 80% of CQC-registered providers, and over 80% of people in receipt of care, have a digital social care record by March 2024. This will mean hundreds of thousands more people will experience higher quality, safer and more personalised care as a result.
2. Enable ICSs to scale up the use of other promising evidence-based technologies.
3. Launch a scheme to use promising care technology to help people live independently in their own homes for longer.

The Digitising Social Care (DiSC) programme has supported ICS implementation of the Adult Social Care Digital Transformation Fund (ASC DTF) during the financial year 22/23. In the financial year 2022/23 the team worked with ICS to offer funding to the sector to support adoption of digital technology. The programme has now reviewed its approach, based on feedback from ICS and planning partners. For 2023/24, four funding pots will be available to support the digitisation of the adult social care sector:

- **Adult Social Care Technology Fund:** Funding for implementation and evaluation of digital care technology, other than digital social care records, to help build a strong evidence base of their impact on people's care.
- **Scaling Fund:** Support for ICS to continue work to scale digital social care records in line with targets set.
- **CQC Market Oversight Providers Fund:** Funding directed at care providers who are on the CQC Market Oversight Providers to simplify the administration associated with accessing funding to scale of DSCRs.
- **Implementation Support:** Funding to provide implementation support at an ICS level to support care providers to scale and adopt digital technology.

We are now seeking applications for projects that will be delivered under the Adult Social Care Technology fund. We are taking a two-stage approach to distribution of funding:

1. **Expression of Interest (EOI):** we are inviting expressions of interest from across the adult social care sector (see Annex 1 for a copy of the EOI form)
2. **Development of full proposals:** following the presentations, we will work with a select number of EOIs to take through to full proposals.

This expression of interest process is open from the 4th April 2023. **You can submit an expression of interest at any time throughout the year**, but we will have set review points, the first of which is the 26th May 2023. If you miss one of these dates, we will hold your EOI until the next review point.

2. Purpose of this guidance

This document provides information and guidance for stage one of the process only (expression of interest). Further, more detailed guidance will be issued separately for stage two of the process. 3. Care technologies

Care technologies can be used by an individual, their carer or care provider to support quality of life and the provision of high quality, safe and personalised care.

They include specialist solutions to support delivery of care, technologies for care providers to facilitate care, and consumer devices, smart home technologies or devices that can help an individual live more independently. Our Care Technology Framework (Annex 2) gives more detail on how we view care technology in adult social care.

Care technologies should:

- Empower individuals, their families, and carers to take control of their own care
- Promote independence and enable people to live well as part of their community
- Enable outstanding quality and personalised care and support
- Make the provision of social care more efficient and effective, releasing time to care for social care workers

4. Scope of the fund

The purpose of this funding is to evaluate the effectiveness of care technologies in adult social care and continue to build the case for further change and innovation. The fund will support the implementation of technology which can be shown to contribute to one or more of the following 3 priorities:

- **An increase in care quality and safety (including safe discharge from hospital)**
 - Technology that can support those offering care to provide outstanding and assured quality, with mechanisms for oversight and governance. This is technology used by, or with direct care staff to sustain or improve the quality of care they provide for people.
- **A reduction in avoidable admission/readmissions to hospital**
 - Technology that can help prevent or reduce avoidable admissions to hospital. This can be technology that is passive or actively used by carers or people in receipt of care, e.g. falls prevention.

- **An increase in support for people to live independently in their own home**
 - Within this priority, we are specifically seeking technologies to **support one or more Instrumental Activity of Daily Living**, and which are intended for use in a person's home:
 - Getting around the community
 - Managing finances
 - Shopping and meal preparation
 - Maintaining a safe and clean home
 - Engaging with others
 - Managing medications.

The fund is focused on building a robust evidence base for the impact of care technology on one or more of these priorities. **We understand that many technologies will relate to more than one.** Proposals may be submitted for any type of digital care technology that has some evidence of impact in a social care setting (see table below).

This fund will be revenue funding only and should not be spent on any capital-based projects. Funding can be spent on hardware required for implementation and evidence generation. In some instances, funding can cover connectivity, however, this should be detailed and costed separately.

The fund will support a wide range of settings including both nursing and residential care homes, an individual's own home, extra care settings, supported living, shared care etc. We encourage bids for technology to support working age adults, as well as older adults.

5. Expressions of interest

We encourage expressions of interest from across the sector including:

- ICS
- CQC registered adult social care providers
- Local authorities
- Evaluation partners.

We are stipulating partnership bids from the sector including all the above, and other relevant partners you might want to draw into the conversation. There should be a named lead for the expression of interest who can be any of the above.

Please be aware that **ICS will be expected to receive the funding and provide the governance and financial spend controls needed to manage a fund of this size.**

Project leads will be expected to:

- Stand up and manage the implementation of the fund
- Identify and manage relationship with evaluation partner
- Facilitate access to evaluation sites on behalf of the evaluation partner
- Build and maintain a benefits framework in partnership with the DiSC Benefits Manager

Given the focus on building a robust evidence base for care technology, the evaluation partner is mandatory. They will be expected to:

- Build an evaluation plan as part of Stage 3 process, working closely with the DiSC team
- Design and conduct the evaluation of the intervention
- Work closely with the DiSC team and any national evaluation partner throughout the lifespan of the work
- Contribute to reporting points identified through the lifespan of the intervention

If you are currently using care technology in an adult social care setting, you may want to consider applying for funding to either extend this activity or strengthen the evaluation of the impact of this technology. This includes projects that might have been funded either via the Adult Social Care Digital Transformation Fund or the Supporting Independence Through Technology funding in financial year 2022/23.

6. Accessing funding: process and requirements

The process will have two main stages:

1. Stage One: Expression of interest
2. Stage Two: Development of full proposal.

Stage 1: Expression of Interest

The expression of interest will cover the following information:

- Main contacts for the proposal
- Link to the three priorities
- Outline of the proposal
- Evaluation and benefits approach
- Costs and timelines.

It has been designed to be light touch to minimize the burden. However, we do need to understand where care technology, which has a growing evidence base of effectiveness, is being used.

The expression of interest form will be available from 4th April 2023 and details on timelines can be found in section 8 below.

Once the stage 1 EOI has been returned, it will be reviewed (see Annex 3 for more details of the review process). Following review, we will work with selected projects to move forward to stage 2 and develop a full proposal. Depending on the level of interest, we may invite projects to present their ideas to us in more detail before selecting projects to move on to stage two proposals.

Stage 2: Development of full proposals

The stage two proposals will include:

- Detailed outline of the project proposed
- Implementation and evaluation plans
- Partnership working arrangements
- Resources required
- Timelines and costs
- Risk management
- Sustainability.

Note: Not all EOIs will proceed to Stage 2. Where this is the case, feedback will be provided if requested and the EOI can be resubmitted.

7. Funding available

As the aim of this funding is to support evidence generation, we want to make sure projects are of a sufficient size and scale to provide robust data that is needed around the use of care technology. As such, each project will be funded up to a maximum of **£600k** over the course of this financial year.

This funding would cover:

- Staffing resource needed to support the work throughout the life of the test period, including project management costs
- Cost of any technology and licenses to be implemented and adopted
- Implementation costs required to set up the technology in the care setting (including

nursing home, residential home, individuals' homes etc.)

- Costs of local evaluation and benefits mapping (**while we do not specify the amount to be spent on this element, it is likely to represent at least 20% of the total funding request**).

This expression of interest process is open from the 4th April 2023. **You can submit an expression of interest at any time throughout the year**, but we will have set review points (see Annex 4 for full detail). If you miss one of the following deadlines, we will hold your EOI until the next review point.

Further information on funding for FY 24/25 will be provided nearer the time.

Depending on the responses received throughout this period we reserve the right to narrow the scope, put a hold or close expressions of interest early.

The funding may spread over two financial years, but we will be allocating funding for FY 23/24 based on 70% on completion of initial paperwork, and the remaining 30% as an interim payment linked to milestones developed. Any funding requested into FY 24/25 will be subject to ongoing milestone review and delivery.

Annex 3 Review process for expressions of interest

Scoring system

When evaluating expressions of interest, we will use the following **scoring system**:

0. Fail: The EOI fails to address the criteria or cannot be assessed due to missing or incomplete information
1. Poor: Multiple criteria are inadequately addressed or there are serious inherent weaknesses
2. Fair: The EOI broadly addresses the criterion well, but there are weaknesses in how multiple criteria are addressed and/or one or more of the criteria is addressed inadequately
3. Good: The EOI addresses all criteria to an acceptable standard or overall proposal is to an acceptable standard as it exceeds expectations on some criterion but has weakness in others
4. Very good: All criteria are met to an acceptable standard, and one or more to a high standard
5. Excellent: All criteria meet acceptable standards; multiple criteria are reached to a high standard and at least one criterion exceeds expectations.

Evaluation Procedure

Proposals will be evaluated by internal and external evaluators (who will provide expert opinion on the evaluation and benefits piece as well as the technology solution proposed).

Individual evaluation

Reviewers work independently to score each proposal against the criteria set out with explanatory comments and complete an evaluation report to indicate if the proposal falls in or out of scope.

Consensus group

After initial review, the reviewers will come together to pool feedback and discuss individual proposals to come to a common position, including scores and comments. Each group will be moderated to ensure consensus building and impartiality.

Panel review

Once agreement is reached and proposals which do not meet our criteria are rejected, the final proposals will be presented to our Senior Leadership Team for final review and prioritisation of proposals. At this point, we may invite some proposals to discuss ideas in more detail before making decisions on progression to stage two of the process.

We will also consult with DiSC scaling leads to understand the local context, current engagement, and progress toward local DSCR adoption targets.
